



# Bavarian highlights

#### **NEUSCHWANSTEIN CASTLE**

A magnificent location; this castle has been the subject of millions of photographs: King Ludwig II's fairytale castle is an absolute must for romantics. Be like the Kini\*, and dream of another, more beautiful world. And if you cannot get enough of this feeling of regal splendour, there are plenty more beautiful castles and palaces in Bavaria that await your visit!

#### THE ZUGSPITZE

It is not just local hearts that beat faster at the top of the Zugspitze Mountain: jagged alpine peaks, breathtaking panoramic views and wonderful skiing can be enjoyed throughout the winter season. The tallest mountain in Germany (2,962 m) is a highlight in every sense of the word.

### LIVELY MUNICH

Munich stands for live and let live more than any other Bavarian city: laptops meet lederhosen, Oktoberfest meets opera festivals; beer gardens meet Michelinstar chefs; modern art meets baroque grandeur.

### BAVARIAN SCHMANKERL SNACKS

In Southern Bavaria, nothing can beat a snack (or "Brotzeit") with "Obatzda" cream cheese, "Brezn" (pretzels) and "Radi" or radish. You can also tuck into some "Weißwurst" (a Bavarian speciality white sausage) before lunchtime. But make sure you have it with sweet mustard! On the other hand, the famous Nuremberg bratwurst is only ever served with strong mustard. Meanwhile, the "Kasspatzen" is a classic on all menus in the Allgäu – it is a hearty pasta dish with cheese. It goes down a treat with a freshly pulled beer. "Ein Prosit der Gemütlichkeit!"

#### CHRISTMAS MARKETS

The Christkindlesmarkt in Nuremberg is probably the most famous Christmas market in the world. It is not just the Lebkuchen, but the bratwurst, which are extremely popular amongst locals too, that have fans across the world. Nuremberg is not alone: Christmas markets across Bavaria exude their aroma of "Glühwein" or mulled wine, sausages and beeswax candles at Christmas time.





#### BAVARIAN ATTITUDE TO LIFE

Many people associate the Bavarian attitude to life with a love of home, the mountains, nature and the blue and white sky. Then there is the "Mia san mia" – Bavarian for "we are who we are". It shows that the people of Bavaria are proud of their individuality. That is why in many parts of Bavaria people consciously speak in dialect, like to raise the region's blue and white flag high in the sky, and even have their own "national anthem". Social togetherness is also a key aspect of life in Bavaria. And because it is best to celebrate with friends, people are soon addressing each other informally; even though they may only just have met.

#### CELEBRATE LIKE THE BAVARIANS

Whether it be a wine festival, the "Almabtrieb" festival, the "Leonhardi-Ritt" horse procession or the "Maidult" beer festival – the popularity of traditions brings young and old, locals and visitors, together in Bavaria. Lederhosen, dirndl and brass bands are, of course, a key part of proceedings. And when the Mayor of Munich shouts "O'zapft is", the most popular season in Bavaria begins: the Oktoberfest season.

#### SPORT AND NATURE

Bayern Munich is one of the biggest clubs in world football. Lots of successful downhill skiers come from Bavaria. And Bavaria is a real Mecca for amateur athletes too: mountain climbing, hiking, climbing, skiing, mountain biking, canoeing, paragliding, canyoning, downhill skiing – sport and nature are one and the same in Bavaria!

### THE ROMANTIC ROAD

The Romantic Road runs from Würzburg on the River Main to the edge of the Alps. It is the route for everyone choosing to discover Germany by car or motorbike. It is named after the many cultural highlights that lie along the route, including the medieval town of Rothenburg, the Fugger town of Augsburg and Neuschwanstein Castle.

### UPMARKET BUT GOOD VALUE

The level of hotels and restaurants is high in Bavaria. Yet, despite this, holidaying in Bavaria is by no means expensive. On the contrary, value for money in Bavaria is considered to be excellent when compared to other regions in the world. And the stunning land-scape is an added extra that costs absolutely nothing!







# What happens in spring and summer!

### **BOCKBIER SEASON**

During the fasting period between Fasching and Easter, the Bavarian breweries serve a particularly strong beer: "Bockbier". It was invented by the monks. They decided that as they had to do without proper food, they needed to make sure that there was no lack of liquid refreshment.

### EASTER TIME

Be it Easter bonfires or Good Friday processions: Easter customs have a long tradition in Bavaria. The Easter Fountain in Franconian Switzerland is particularly worth seeing. Countless fountains are decorated with brightly coloured eggs, flowers, wreaths and garlands in over 200 towns between Good Friday and the two weeks after Easter.

### PUTTING UP THE MAYPOLE

The maypole tradition has been around in Bavaria since the 16<sup>th</sup> century. On 1<sup>st</sup> May each year, a lavishly decorated tree trunk is erected: the maypole. Once erected, the villagers dance around the maypole to welcome in May. The period leading up to the maypole dance is exciting for youngsters in the village. It is tradition to steal the felled, but not yet erected maypole from the neighbouring village. As such, the maypole needs to be guarded around the clock. If the kids from the neighbouring village still manage to steal the maypole without being detected, a large amount of beer needs to be ransomed.

### HISTORICAL FESTIVALS

Bavaria has a great festival tradition. Germany's largest historical festival play – the "Spearing of the Dragon" – takes place in August of each year in Furth im Wald. Meanwhile, the "Landshut Wedding", the Kaltenberg Knight Games, "The Master Draught" in Rothenburg and the Wallenstein Festival in Memmingen are all famous far beyond the borders of Bavaria. Be sure to book your tickets and accommodation well in advance!

### CELEBRATING THE SOLSTICE

Solstice fires blaze across Bavaria on the 21<sup>st</sup> June. In times gone by, it was believed that the fires drove away evil spirits. These days, the fires serve as a place to come together with friends and family and to enjoy the spectacle as the towering pile of wood burns atmospherically.

### FOREST AND LAKE FESTIVALS

For Munich it is the Oktoberfest; for Tegernsee and the surrounding area the forest and lake festivals. The best thing about it: The festival season lasts the entire summer.







# There is plenty to celebrate in autumn and winter!

When the Almabtrieb and Oktoberfest come around, it is a sign that summer is over; but the festival season is by no means over ...

### "ALMABTRIEB" AND "VIEHSCHEID"

The summer spent by the cattle in the mountains, traditionally closes with the "Almabtrieb", or "Viehscheid" (Cattle Drive) as it is called in the Allgäu region. After around a hundred days grazing on the alpine meadows, the yearlings are brought back down into the valleys in September, where they are welcomed by the locals and guests with a folk festival.

### OKTOBERFEST, GÄUBODENVOLKSFEST & CO.

Each year, the Munich Oktoberfest attracts millions of visitors from around the world to Bavaria – it is the largest public festival in the world. But the Gäubodenvolksfest in Straubing, Nuremberg's Old Town Festival and the Plärrer in Augsburg are also well-loved traditional festivals far beyond the towns in which they are held.

### ATMOSPHERIC CHRISTMAS MARKETS

Nuremberg's Christkindlesmarkt and Rothenburg's Reiterlesmarkt, Kempten's and Regensburg's Christmas markets, Tegernsee's Adventzauber – romantic Christmas markets throughout Bavaria attract visitors during the Advent season. The aroma of roasted almonds, lebkuchen and mulled wine lingers; whilst the beautifully decorated stalls display all kinds of wonderful handicrafts.



### DRIVING AWAY THE EVIL SPIRITS "TWEI FTH NIGHT"

The "Twelfth Night", which takes place between 21st December and 6th January, is said to stop the evil work of bad spirits. In times gone by, living rooms and cowsheds were fumigated with incense. Nowadays, annual "Perchten" processions take place each year on the "Twelfth Night" in many of Bavaria's towns and villages. "Perchten" are mythical creatures who, according to Bavarian legend, are said to appear in late December/ January. Members of groups dedicated to ancient customs wear masks that they have carved out of wood, furs and leather, and swarm through the streets, shrieking, banging drums and playing the fiddle in order to ward away the winter demons. Then spring can come!

### HORN SLED RACING

Bavarian championship takes place every year on Epiphany in Garmisch-Partenkirchen: brave men and women race down the hillside at speeds of up to 100 km/h on two- to three-metre-long wooden sleds. In days gone by, these sleds were used as tools by miners and as winter vehicles to carry hay or felled wood from the remote meadows down into the valley.

### CARNIVAL REVELRY

The crazy season tends to begin in February. Each region has its own Fasching traditions ("Fasching" refers to the German carnival season in the run up to Shrove Tuesday). In Munich, the market women dance. In the Allgäu, the goblin wanders around. In Franconia, witches made from straw are burnt. And in Eastern Bavaria, the Fasching is carried to his grave on the evening before Ash Wednesday. Fasching processions take place in lots of different villages and towns. Your best bet is to don a mask and join in the madness.

### ROMANTIC ROTHENBURG

Here you can wander through thousands of years of history and see long-forgotten eras brought back to life: Founded in 970, besieged during the Thirty Years' War and now a destination for tourists from across the globe: Rothenburg lies on the River Tauber, on the edge of the Frankenhöhe natural reserve.

### IMPERIAL NUREMBERG

The symbol of Nuremberg – the Imperial Castle – is one of the most important royal palaces. The city is just as widely known for its bratwurst sausages, the Christkindlesmarkt, the Albrecht Dürer House and the Nazi Party Rally Grounds Documentation Centre. The modern exhibition and congress centre also brings Nuremberg visitors from across the world.

### BAMBERG "FRANCONIAN ROME"

The former imperial and diocesan town of Bamberg is one of the most beautiful towns in Germany, and has been a designated UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1993. "Franconian Rome" was built on seven hills and is famous for its sights, which include the cathedral, "Little Venice" and the "Altes Rathaus" on the island in the River Regnitz. *en.bamberg.info* 

### THE WAGNER TOWN OF BAYREUTH

Bayreuth grew as a margravial residence and became famous as a result of the Richard Wagner Festival. And with the Festival Theatre atop its "Grüner Hügel" or "green hill", the town is home to possibly the best-preserved baroque theatre in Europe, the UNESCO World Heritage Margravial Opera House.

### PASSAU. THE TOWN OF THREE RIVERS

The beautiful town of Passau is situated where the Danube, Inn and Ilz meet. The former bishop and princely residence impresses with its tall towers, picturesque squares and baroque building façades. Meanwhile, the largest cathedral organ in the world can be seen and heard in St Stephan's Cathedral.

### REGENSBURG At the top of the danube

The best-preserved medieval town in Germany is situated on the northernmost point of the River Danube. Regensburg was founded by the Romans and experienced its heyday under the dukes. Symbols like the Old Stone Bridge, the "Alte Rathaus" (old town hall) and St Peter's Cathedral all bear witness to the town's illustrious past. www.regensburg.de/tourismus

### THE FORMER DUCAL TOWN OF I ANDSHUT

Trausnitz Castle is the town's landmark; whilst the Residence is the first renaissance palace north of the Alps. Landshut is home to both wide boulevards and romantic labyrinthine alleyways. #### THE FUGGER TOWN OF AUGSBURG

The town, which was founded over 2,000 years ago, succeeded in achieving great importance in the late Middle Ages thanks to the Fuggers – a Swabian merchant family. The Fuggerei – the oldest social housing development in the world – also dates back to this period. The Rathaus – a renaissance-style town hall – is Augsburg's landmark. www.augsburg-tourismus.de

### FÜSSEN - AT THE FOOT OF THE ALPS

Proud townhouses with gothic gables and lavishly decorated churches from the baroque and rococo periods, surrounded by a truly regal landscape: The Hohe Schloss towers over the town of Füssen, and the famous Neuschwanstein Castle is also nearby. *en.fuessen.de* 

### MEDIEVAL NÖRDLINGEN

The town centre is unlike any other on the planet: The entire city walls can be walked along and the "Daniel" church tower, from which the night watchman still calls every evening, can be seen from far and wide. www.noerdlingen.de

### Passau - the city on three rivers

The mighty rivers of the Danube, the Inn and the Ilz come together in Passau, one of the biggest cities in Eastern Bavaria. Every year this city on the Austrian border makes an exciting venue for thousands of tourists – and not just because of its extraordinary geographical location.

Passau also combines artefacts from Roman times with medieval architecture and contemporary art. Following in the footsteps of the Romans, visitors stroll through Boiotro Castle. In the remains of this former Roman fortress, built in the year 280 AD, researchers discovered a number of items, including parts of weapons, ancient spades and bronze fragments. History buffs can marvel at these and many other Roman relics in the museum belonging to the castle.

Visitors to the Veste Oberhaus move from Roman occupation on to the Middle Ages. Here children can enjoy a hands-on approach to history and find out for themselves how heavy a knight's armour really was. Even adults may be amazed at how cold and draughty life was in a medieval castle. In a special cold room they can experience the uncomfortable conditions at first hand.

Those who love splendid architecture will find inspiration in St. Stephan's Cathedral. The white towers and blue-green domes of this Baroque church stand out from a distance. Before entering the cathedral, visitors first stroll through Passau's old town with its characteristic facades. They then come to the doors of this impressive building – and look up in awe at the largest cathedral organ in the world with its 17,974 pipes.

Modern art can be viewed in the Museum Moderner Kunst Wörlen. This museum houses the complete works of Georg Philipp Wörlen, including many drawings, watercolours and woodcuts from his various creative phases. Changing exhibitions of international artists are shown in the historic Kunstmuseum in Bräugasse 17 – a highlight for travellers with an interest in art and just one of the many exciting sights of Passau.

### Rothenburg ob der Tauber

Narrow streets and historic half-timbered houses – visitors who stroll through the small city feel as if they have been transported back into the Middle Ages.







This is what has made Rothenburg famous around the world. In this picturesque town on the Romantic Road, visitors can soak up history with all their senses – including their taste buds. For example, every year in the middle of August, they can enjoy Franconian wines and regional specialities at the Rothenburg Wine Festival.

Cannon fire thunders in the streets and troops of horsemen ride through the town as the historical annual festival known as "Der Meistertrunk" (The Master Draught) harks back to the legendary deliverance of Rothenburg in the Thirty Years War. Another historical festival takes place every year on the first weekend of September: The Imperial City Festival will immerse you into medieval times. Historical groups occupy the old town of Rothenburg in this reenactment.

The romantic charm of Rothenburg and its surrounding landscape has inspired numerous artists and architects. Three themed years, the ART Celebration Years 2019–2021, are dedicated to picturesque Rothenburg. An exhibition in the Medieval Crime and Justice Museum, for example, will showcase the work of British painters around 1900. The Imperial Town Museum will display views of Rothenburg from the early modern period to the present day. www.rothenburg.de/tourismus

### KÄTHE WOHLFAHRT'S CHRISTMAS ALL YEAR ROUND

Christmas tradition, German craftsmanship and a snowy winter scene await visitors to "Käthe Wohlfahrt's Christmas Village". For 40 years it has been Christmas here all the year round - even in the height of summer. Sparkling lights, colorful baubles and a large white Christmas tree turn a visit here into a magical shopping experience. Alongside artistic Christmas decorations from the German Erzgebirge, the designs of the artists and craftsmen from the "Rothenburg Christmas Workshop" are especially popular. Here travelers are sure to find a very special gift to take home from Germany for their loved ones or a souvenir of their visit to the magical city of Rothenburg ob der Tauber. The "Christmas Town" is also home to the German Christmas Museum, which has a permanent exhibition depicting the history of Christmas in Germany. Hundreds of historic displays tell the story of the traditional Christmas decorations, accompanied by lovingly presented, informative text panels in German and English.

### World Heritage Sites

Magnificent residences, entire old towns, a baroque opera house and a pilgrimage church at the foot of the Alps: UNESCO has included numerous examples of European history in its list of World Heritage Sites.

### **WÜRZBURG RESIDENCE**

Napoleon considered it to be "the most beautiful parsonage in Europe". Between 1719 and 1780, master builders and sculptors from across Europe created a palace that incorporated all of the great occidental architectural fashions of the time. The mirror cabinet, which was reconstructed between 1979 and 1987, has been named the most perfect piece of rococo installation art in the world.

### REGENSBURG OLD TOWN & STADTAMHOF

The former political and economic might of the city has shaped the cityscape to this day: Regensburg is the best-preserved medieval city in Germany. "Regensburg Old Town with the Stadtamhof" has been a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 2006. It includes 984 individual listed buildings.

### BAMBERG OLD TOWN

Holy Roman Emperor Henry II had nothing less than a new Rome in mind when he declared Bamberg to be a seat of bishopric and imperial power in 1007. Today, over 1,000 listed buildings comprise the largest historical town centre in Germany, consisting of the "Bergstadt" (hill town), the "Inselstadt" (island town) and the "Gärtnerstadt" (gardener town).

#### BAYREUTH MARGRAVIAL OPERA HOUSE

The most important and best-preserved baroque theatre building stands as testament to the exuberant lifestyle enjoyed by the absolutist society. The opera house's interior, which is constructed solely from wood, is the only one of its kind on the planet. The UNESCO committee honoured the opera house as "a unique monument of European baroque festival and music culture".

### "WIES" PILGRIMAGE CHURCH

When the Wies farmwoman Maria Lori noticed tears in the eyes of the Jesus statue in June 1738, it put an end to the insularity of the Upper Bavarian region of "Pfaffenwinkel". A small chapel was quickly built on the farmland, but it soon became too small to receive the great number of pilgrims. The nearby Steingaden Abbey then commissioned the construction of a pilgrimage church. The building that was created between 1745 and 1754 under the supervision of architect Dominikus Zimmermann, was described centuries later by the UNESCO committee as one of the "most perfect works of rococo art in Bavaria".

### LIMES AND PILE DWELLINGS

The Limes - the Roman frontier - spans over 550 kilometres from the River Rhine to near Regensburg. The 111 prehistoric Pile dwellings dotted around the Alps, which were named a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 2011, also spark great fascination amongst visitors. One of these can be admired on the Roseninsel by the west bank of Lake Starnberg.

#### INGOLSTADT VILLAGE

Shop like a king! The luxury outlet of Ingolstadt Village is home to everything that discerning fashionistas could possibly desire. You can wander from boutique to boutique under the open sky. There are over 100 shops in total! Instead of a shopping mall atmosphere, you can look forward to stylish art nouveau architecture. Plus excellent services such as a Muslim prayer room, childcare and a shuttle service to and from both Munich.

### DIRNDL & LEDERHOSEN

Traditional costumes are bang on trend. The number of shops selling traditional costumes has grown considerably over the past few years. From party dirndls to designer pieces: the options are great. The best-known traditional establishments include Trachten Angermaier in Munich and Nuremberg, and Lodenfrey in Munich. Then there are studios like Samtherz, which are dedicated to costume fashion.

#### FAMOUS PROMENADES

Shopping in Bavaria is a relaxing activity. Most of the larger towns and cities have pedestrianised zones running throughout the town centres, meaning that they are car-free. The Kaufingerstraße in Munich is one of the most popular shopping streets. Then there is Munich's Maximilianstraße, which is even more exclusive: Jewellers, art galleries and upmarket interior design shops stand alongside the boutiques of international fashion designers. Meanwhile, the number one shopping street in Nuremberg is the Karolinenstraße. It is surrounded by the many smaller streets of Nuremberg's city centre, all featuring shops and boutiques designed to set the heart racing.

### A great show: Bavaria's scenic routes

The destination is the journey itself. Routes like the Alpine Road, the Romantic Road and the Sisi Road lead you through spectacular natural landscapes, take you in the footsteps of legends, and give you an insight into Bavaria's wealth of culture.



#### HEAVEN IS SO CLOSE

THE GERMAN ALPINE ROAD It is one of the most spectacular routes in Germany: It spans around 450 kilometres, from Lake Constance, through the northern Alps to Berchtesgaden National Park. Besides Germany's highest mountain – the Zugspitze – the route also takes you past a range of famous abbeys, churches and castles.



### WANDER THROUGH THE GLASS FOUNDRIES

**THE GLASS ROAD** This route spans around 250 kilometres, from the Bavarian border with the Czech Republic right into the heart of a region that is home to a craft dating back hundreds of years. Traditional glass foundries present their finished works of art, whilst glass galleries and museums show that glass is far more than an article of daily use. Some of the glass foundries even allow you to have a go at creating your own work of art.



### PICTURESQUE NATURAL SCENERY

THE ROMANTIC ROAD Probably the most popular German holiday route, the Romantic Road runs from Würzburg at the river Main to Neuschwanstein Castle in the Bavarian Alps, and offers holidaymakers a wonderful combination of nature, culture and hospitality. From April to October, romantics can also visit the attractions along the route via bus using the convenient "hop on – hop off" system.



### FOLLOWING IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF THE KNIGHTS

THE CASTLE ROUTE Knights' armour, fortifications, drawbridges and mysterious tower rooms with magnificent views – fans of old ruins will get more than their money's worth on this route between Mannheim and Bayreuth. In Bavaria, the Castle Route takes visitors via Rothenburg ob der Tauber, Nuremberg and Coburg. Food and drink are, of course, a key part of what awaits discovery. Some castle kitchens serve original dishes from the Middle Ages or stay overnight in a castle hotel.

# Spiritual places

Walk along old pilgrimage routes, stay over in an abbey or visit special religious sites: Discover the spiritual power of Bavaria.

### LUTHER TOUR "SITES OF THE REFORMATION"

In 2017, the 500<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Reformation took place. The "Luther Tour" route takes tourists in the footsteps of Martin Luther and to the sites of the Reformation in Germany. The southernmost stop is the Fugger town of Augsburg, and further destinations include the imperial city of Nuremberg and Coburg in Franconia. Martin Luther spent half a year at the Veste Coburg in 1530. The tour is recommendable for religious and cultural lovers alike.

### OBERAMMERGAU'S PASSION PLAY THE OBERAMMERGAU MEDITATION TRAIL

The history of the Oberammergau Passion Plays is inseparable from the time of the Thirty Years' War and the plague. In 1633, some citizens of the town promised to carry out a "Passion Play" every ten years if the suffering came to a swift end. According to folklore, from this point onwards the plague did not take any new victims. Since 1634, the people of Oberammergau have been performing their "play" every ten years, with a few exceptions due to historical events. The next Passion Play will take place in 2020. The Ammergau Alps Meditation Trail leads directly past the Passion Play Theatre. This 87-kilometre route takes you from the pilgrimage church "Wies" in Steingaden through the wonderful Ammertal Valley to Linderhof Palace near Ettal.

### THE MARY PILGRIMAGE SITE OF ALTÖTTING

This town has been the spiritual centre of Bavaria for over 1,250 years, and the most important Mary pilgrimage site in Germany for over 500 years. The "Black Mother of God" in the Chapel of Grace's octagon is the destination for over 1 million pilgrims and visitors each year. Alongside the statue with its believed miraculous powers, the small church is also home to the silver heart urns of the Bavarian kings and prince bishops, as well as valuable offerings.

#### OHEL JAKOB SYNAGOGUE


It is not just Christian sites that make up the sacred sites in Bavaria: The main synagogue, the Jewish Museum and the community hall for the Jewish community are all found on St Jakobs Platz in Munich, in the direct proximity of Marienplatz and Viktualienmarkt; right in the heart of the city. Together these buildings form the city's Jewish centre.

#### TIME OUT IN THE PEACE OF BAVARIA

Under "Stade Zeiten", you will find holidays in Bavaria which allow you to rest: stay in remote refuges in tranquil villages. Visit monasteries whose walls radiate security. Or forget your everyday life, whilst you help with the grape harvest.

### Royal palaces for eterrity

Crowned as king in 1864, King Ludwig II began construction of Neuschwanstein Castle in 1867/68 and was already dreaming of Linderhof and Herrenchiemsee. His visions still shape the image of Bavaria across the world to this day.

### NEUSCHWANSTEIN CASTLE

The idealist replica of a medieval castle sits enthroned on a jagged rockface, in front of a picturesque mountain scene, and is famous all over the world. The reclusive King Ludwig II dreamt of withdrawing from the public to this castle but he was never able to realise his dream of living in the fairytale castle: It opened its doors to the public just a few days after his death.

### HERRENCHIEMSEE: THE BAVARIAN VERSAILLES

King Ludwig II – a great admirer of King Louis XIV of France – commissioned a replica of the palace and gardens of Versailles to be built on the Herreninsel on Lake Chiemsee. Among the state apartments, it is above all the State Staircase, the Great Hall of Mirrors and the State Bedroom that stand out. From the palace, the views span across the expansive gardens down to the lake.

### LINDERHOF PALACE AND PARK

Ludwig II's "Royal Villa" was inspired by a hunting lodge built by his father Maximilian II – the so-called "Königshäuschen" or King's Cottage. It is the only castle that King Ludwig II built that he lived to see completed.



### Proud castles and fortresses

### THE LONGEST CASTLE IN EUROPE

Burghausen Castle, with its almost intact medieval defensive fortifications, is one of the longest castles in the world, spanning over 1,000 metres.

#### **VESTE COBURG**

This castle was first mentioned in official documents back in 1056 and was extended in the late Middle Ages to become one of the largest castles in Germany. The reformer Luther was a famous guest here in 1530: He spent time at the castle working on his translation of the bible.

#### HOHENSCHWANGAU CASTLE

Crown Prince Maximilian II of Bavaria, Ludwig II's father, had the ruined castle of Schwanstein rebuilt from 1832 into the "Gothic style" of Hohenschwangau Castle. The young Ludwig was influenced by the romantic mountain scenery and the summer castle became one of his favourite places to stay.


### TRAUSNITZ CASTLE

The castle of Trausnitz in Landshut was the seat of the noble Wittelsbach family starting in 1204. From 1255 to 1503 it was also the residence and seat of government of the Dukes of Lower Bavaria. The medieval castle is noted for its impressive fortifications, its high Wittelsbacher Tower and its castle chapel.

No visit to a beer garden is complete without prezels, "Obazda" cream cheese and radish. And "Weißwurst"? It should never hear the chime ring 12. In other words, "Weißwurst" is for breakfast. Ideally with a smooth wheat beer. Popular in all seasons: a crispy "Schweinshaxe" or pork knuckle.

### EASTERN BAVARIA: THIS IS WHERE IT GETS HEAVY

Eastern Bavarian cuisine is often very rustic. Meat platters, "Dradewixpfeiferl" (finger-shaped potato pasta) or smoked ham are just a few of the classics. And they should all be washed down with a local beer or a double Bärwurz schnapps! Prost (as they say in Germany).

### FRANCONIA - WINE AND SAUSAGE!

Many of the best Müller-Thurgau wines originate from Franconia. You can enjoy the fine wines in great company at one of the numerous wine festivals in the region. Besides the wine, it is the bratwurst that guests are particularly fond of. The best-seller at Christmas time: Nuremberg Lebkuchen.

### ALLGÄU-BAVARIAN SWABIA: "SPÄTZLE" PASTA AND AN AWFUL LOT OF CHEESE

Allgäu cows are said to be the finest in the world. Their milk is used as the basis for lots of specialities. Emmentaler, "Bergkäse" mountain cheese and the much-loved "Kässpätzle" (a type of cheesy pasta) are known far beyond the region's borders. Meanwhile, "Zwetschgendatschi" is one of Augsburg's specialities: It is a plum cake baked on a tray that is sure to sweeten every summer afternoon.

#### THE BEER STATE OF BAVARIA

Word has it that in Bavaria beer is a staple food. Over half of all German breweries are to be found in Bavaria. And Bavarian beer is not just known for its tangy flavour, but also for its excellent quality. The Bavarian Purity Law from 1516 is still valid to this day. It states that beer can only contain hops, malt, yeast and water. In 2016, the Purity Law was proclaimed for the 500th time.

### Hofbräuhaus: A real piece of Bavaria

The Hofbräuhaus in Munich is the most famous tavern in the world. Around two million guests from all over the world visit the restaurant in the heart of the old town every year. They experience the genuine Bavarian lifestyle, for the Hofbräuhaus is very popular amongst the locals too. More than 400 regulars even keep their own personal beer mug in the tavern's own mug safe. This combination of Bavarian tradition and international flair can otherwise only be found at the Oktoberfest – where the Hofbräu brewery also has a tent.

The house band plays every day in the Hofbräuhaus' largest hall, the Schwemme with 1,300 spaces. The musicians get the guests moving with traditional Bavarian music. It is worth a visit for the festive atmosphere alone. The waiters serve Bavarian delicacies every few minutes: the aroma of crispy pork knuckle, juicy roast pork and aromatic Obatzda fills the room and makes your mouth water.

The guests can quench their thirst with the singularly palatable Hofbräu beer. It was even brewed directly in the Hofbräuhaus from 1607 to 1896. Now, the Hofbräu brewmasters work at the outskirts of Munich. Here, Hofbräu fans can have a closer look at how the traditional beer specialities are produced from water, hops, malt and yeast, during brewery tours.

Anyone who can't travel to Bavaria can stop for a bite to eat in one of the international branches of the Hofbräuhaus. There are now eleven Hofbräuhaus branches in three continents, and they provide just as authentic a Hofbräuhaus experience as the original one. Or you can order a piece of Hofbräu for your home: the online shop offers a wide selection of fan articles, including high-quality beer glasses, traditional stone mugs and even its own collection of traditional dress.

### Franconia - Home of beer

Beer has a strong tradition in Franconia – there's a good reason why the region calls itself the "home of beer". With roughly 300 breweries, Franconia has the highest density of breweries in the world.





Friends of the "liquid gold" can find a whole host of private breweries in Franconia – some of which have been in family ownership for centuries. In rustic inns, guests sit together and enjoy the unique Franconian art of brewing – while tucking into some delicious local specialities.

Hops – the valuable raw material of Franconian beer – are grown in the Franconian Lake District. Here the so-called "green gold" is particularly aromatic and tasty. In the middle of the hop-growing area, in the town of Spalt, some 60 kilometres south of Nuremberg, is the "HopfenBierGut" Museum. Visitors to the museum become brewers themselves and experience the Franconian beer culture as green hops turn into golden beer in front of their eyes. On the trail of beer, they stroll through the historic Nuremberg. In these subterranean passages, deep under the city, medieval brewers used to cool the fresh beer.

Bamberg and Bayreuth are UNESCO World Heritage sites – and also true bastions of beer culture. In Bamberg, visitors have plenty of opportunity to taste fresh home-brewed beer. The city is home to a grand

total of eleven breweries. They can also look forward to a very unusual speciality in Bamberg: Here they can discover Bamberg's smoked beer, with the rich aroma of freshly smoked malt. In Maisel's Beer Adventure World in Bayreuth, guests experience up close the secrets of the Franconian art of brewing, which combines tradition and modern technology.

However, it's not just in the inns and brewery restaurants that visitors can enjoy a variety of beers. There are also a number of beer festivals in Franconia – such as the Annafest in Forchheim in July and the Kulmbacher Bierwoche in July and August. The Erlanger Bergkirchweih always takes place around Whitsun – and is an absolute highlight for beer fans. Visitors looking for something truly special will relish a culinary beer tasting. Here, professional beer sommeliers explain the unique look, smell and taste of different beer varieties.

From experimental craft beer to centuries-old traditional recipes and on to universally popular classics – in the deep-rooted Franconian beer culture there's something for every beer lover.



Nördlinger
